Battle of Crete Memorial Dedication and Wreath Laying Ceremony

What you see before you today is an Australian war memorial, with a focus on those Western Australians that served, but it is more than that.

This Memorial also recognises and pays respect to the people of Crete who not only fought bravely, but also risked so much to assist Australian and Allied personnel defending the island, particularly their efforts to assist Allied troops evade capture in the aftermath of the battle.

The role of the Cretan people in assisting our soldiers was also recognised by the late Corporal Geoff Edwards OAM who remembered the bravery and sacrifice of the Cretans who helped him evade capture. He built in Margaret River in an area he named Prevelly Park, a Greek Orthodox Church, St John the Theologian, after the monastery at Preveli on Crete. During the battle, 274 Australian soldiers were killed, 507 wounded and 3,102 taken prisoner.



Symbolism in the memorial design



The broken Column is a metaphor for a life cut short



Australian Solder of the 2nd/11th (City of Perth) Battalion facing North, the direction from where the invaders of Crete had come



Facing West, is a Greek Soldier of 1941. The symbolism of a Western facing ally is of an enduring connection between both nations



Facing South is a Royal Australian Navy Rating. HMA Ships Perth, Napier and Nizam fought valiantly in the campaign to keep sea lanes open and assist in the evacuation of the troops



Facing East is a rural Cretan woman - her presence recognizes the courageous efforts of the Cretan villagers and clergy in feeding and protecting our soldiers with considerable risk to their own lives



A funeral wreath of eucalyptus leaves is inlaid in the circular base. The base contains a dedication to the defenders of the island and a quote from the ancient Greek general and historian Thucydides. "Freedom stems from Valour" History of the Peloponnesian War (2.43.2)
